Austin, M., & Hopkins, K. (Eds.). (2004). *Supervision as collaboration in the human services: Building a learning culture*. Thousand Oaks, California: Sage Publications.

This book offers a new approach for effective practice in the 21st century while building on past efforts to define the principles and practices of supervision in learning cultures to strengthen organizational learning. Each chapter author carries authority in their respective areas of practice and each chapter include case vignettes and discussion questions.

Mental health in early intervention : achieving unity in principles and practice. (2006).

G. M. Foley & J. D. Hochman (Eds.), Baltimore: Paul H. Brookes.

This comprehensive book fully prepares readers to integrate two interdependent fields of infant mental health and early intervention to improve practices through integration. Focuses on specific mental health principles and practices to early intervention work, issues related to loss, grief, culture, class, and diversity, program organization and changes in policy, and best professional development options.

Hoel, J. (1998). *Cross-system collaboration: Tools that work*. Washington D.C.: CWLA.

This book, designed to be a practical assistance to families, agencies, and communities presents one delivery outcome of the “Mapping New Direction III” Initiative. A product of this initiative is a ‘toolbox’ of effective principles for collaboration, using a strengthsbased philosophy that emphasizes ‘what works’ with integrating human services at the local level through cross-system collaboration.

Jaffe, P. G., Baker, L. L., & Cunningham, A. J. (Eds.). (2004). *Protecting children from domestic violence: Strategies for community intervention*. New York: Guilford Press.

This volume brings together leading mental health, legal, educational, and social services professionals from the U.S. and Canada to demonstrate how the problem of violence in the home can best be mitigated through community collaboration. The book provides an understanding of the effects of childhood exposure to domestic violence; considers the most promising assessment approaches; and examines specific interventions with victims and offenders.

Martinez-Brawley, E. E. (2000). *Close To Home: Human services and the small community*. NASW PRESS.

Covers the major issues facing human services delivery in small towns. A focus on the sociocultural distinctions of small-town America, the book explores their way of life, patterns of relationships, and the importance of shared history.

McCarthy, J., Meyers, J., & Jackson, V. (1999). *The adoption and safe families act: Exploring the opportunity for collaboration between child mental health and child welfare service systems*. Washington D.C.: Georgetown University Press.

Includes the key provisions of ASFA, implications for the child welfare and court systems; implementing mental health and substance abuse systems in ASFA; examples of collaboration among child welfare, mental health, and substance abuse systems; perspectives from birth, foster, and adoptive families; and resources available.

Minuchin, P., Colapinto, J., & Minuchin, S. (2006). *Working with families of the poor*. New York: Guilford Press.

This text and practical guidebook presents the fundamentals of family-based intervention with clients struggling with chronic poverty-related crises and life stressors. Grounded in Salvador Minuchin's influential systemic model and the extensive experience of all three highly regarded authors, the book illustrates innovative ways for professionals within substance abuse, foster care, and mental health contexts to build collaboration with families and other helpers, and to elicit families' strengths. This second edition features many new case examples and includes discussions of exemplary programs.
